We will be highlighting various sessions planned for the Forum in each of our spring newsletters. In this edition, we are pleased to preview the session on hosting Bicycle Safety events. During the Forum, join guest speakers from Safe Kids, Greenville Health System, and the Aiken Public Safety Department for a discussion on how they have partnered with schools to bring bicycle safety education to students.

Penny Bostain is the Special Project Coordinator of School Health within Children's Advocacy of the Greenville Health System. Penny is a retired public school educator and consultant. She has worked alongside Safe Routes to School to support safe walking and biking to school through events and travel assessments for several schools in Greenville. Penny developed a bicycle skills and safety education curriculum targeting 4th and 5th graders for in-school and out-of-school programs, created an adult instructor training module, and oversaw the development of three bike trailers containing bicycles and other equipment to teach the curriculum.

Lt. Karl Odenthal, is the supervisor in the Community Service Division for Aiken Public Safety. Lt. Odenthal has worked in law enforcement and with Aiken Public Safety for just under 25 years. Since 1994, he has been involved with bicycle education for law enforcement officers and cyclists of all ages. Lt. Odenthal developed Bikes and Books at Aiken Public Safety two years ago. Bikes and Books launched at North Aiken Elementary, where officers meet with students once a week to develop their reading levels and bicycle skills. In addition, Lt. Odenthal is a key contributor to the annual Aiken Bicycle Rodeo by developing the bicycle skills course, conducting bicycle repairs, and refurbishing bicycles to be raffled off.
